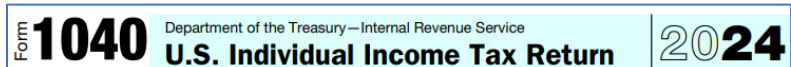
Resources for Seniors During Tax Season

It's tax season once again, and seniors have options for getting their tax return done AT NO CHARGE.

AARP Foundation Tax-Aide

provides tax assistance to anyone, free of charge, with a special focus on taxpayers who are over 50 or have low-to-moderate income. Tax-Aide volunteers are IRS certified and the Site Locator Tool is updated and available from February through April.



Visit https://www.aarp.org/money/taxes/aarp_taxaide/ or call **1-888-227-7669**. Provide your ZIP Code and you'll receive locations, hours of operation and phone numbers for assistance in your area.

Additionally, the Internal Revenue Service offers free basic tax return preparation to qualified individuals. The IRS's **Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA)** and **Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE)** programs offer free tax help to people who need assistance in preparing their own returns, including:

- People who generally make \$67,000 or less
- Persons with disabilities
- Limited English-speaking taxpayers

In addition to VITA, the **TCE program offers free tax help**, particularly for those who are 60 years of age and older, specializing in questions about pensions and retirement-related issues unique to seniors. Volunteer Profile: Mary Jo Mitchell, ILR Reach Coordinator

Some people ease into volunteering by donating time to worthy causes on an occasional basis. But **Mary Jo Mitchell didn't take the easy way.**



"I kind of jumped right in," she says of her fast-track experience at ILR, adding that volunteering helps provide a sense of purpose. Shortly after attending her first ILR class in 2023, she began serving as a host coordinator. About a year ago, she joined the ILR Marketing Committee and promptly offered to coordinate the ILR Reach program.

ILR Reach brings one-hour in-person presentations to community locations as a means of promoting lifelong

learning while showcasing about 25 ILR teachers and 100 topics. The Reach program, which originally targeted senior living facilities, is now expanding to other community settings such as senior centers and libraries.

"Our focus began as a way to engage the senior community," says Mary Jo, but **"you don't necessarily have to be a senior to enjoy one of our Reach programs."**

Mary Jo emphasizes the value of person-to-person contact when lining up programs with staff at potential Reach venues. Her approach includes multiple phone calls and on-site visits to introduce, offer and schedule presentations. **ILR Reach is on pace to arrange 60 total presentations for 2025.**

Before sharing her talents with ILR, **Mary Jo immersed herself in social-service volunteer roles** for Common Threads thrift stores and Peripeti, maker of non-toxic home fragrance products. Her professional background included systems engineering and sales responsibilities for IBM, so the ILR Marketing Committee was a natural fit. In addition to ILR Reach, Mary Jo is spearheading a project to evaluate and implement **digital marketing strategies** for better serving ILR members.

Mary Jo and her husband, **Mello – an ILR instructor** – reside in Strongsville. In her spare time, Mary Jo enjoys exploring Cleveland's heralded Metroparks and reading fiction.

Her involvement with ILR provides a good perspective on the organization's value to area residents.

"ILR is a very welcoming organization," Mary Jo enthuses. "I believe **lifelong learning is a vital contributor to seniors' mental health and activity**, and provides a much-needed service to the community. It's all good."

The ILR community is saddened by the Jan. 9 passing of **Jeffrey A. Fine**. A resident of Solon, Mr. Fine **served as President of ILR East**, which offers classes at Temple Emanu El in Orange. He also volunteered as a docent at the Maltz Museum in Beachwood. Our ILR Sunshine Committee has sent a condolence card to the ILR East office and Fine family.

Neal Malicky, PhD, President of Baldwin Wallace University from 1981 to 1999, died Nov. 22, 2024. Dr. Malicky was widely recognized for his warmth and leadership that helped BW expand undergraduate and graduate programs, increase student enrollment and transform the campus through ambitious renovation and construction projects. He was an **enthusiastic supporter of ILR at BW** as co-founders recruited professors and other educators in the early 1990s to teach courses on a wide array of topics.

ILR member **Catherine Ryan** passed away recently following a short illness. She was a resident of Rocky River and our Sunshine Committee has sent a condolence card to her estate.
